In October enjoy <u>The School</u> <u>Magazine</u>, the world's longest continuously published children's literary magazine at an exhibition curated by the National Centre for Australian Children's Literature. Centre volunteers have installed a sample of its unique resources for **The School Magazine** display at Libraries ACT Civic Branch. The Exhibition opened on 23 September and runs until 21 October 2016 and is open during the Library's hours of business.

The Centre holds the full run of copies from 1916 and wanted to celebrate the achievements of the many authors and illustrators who were inspired to become creators as a result of the magazine.

Perhaps you or a family member was one such author or illustrator? Research of the magazine shows a policy of bringing quality writing and illustrating into children's lives. Established and new creators work is represented. You can see a young May Gibbs work in the earliest 1916 issues of *The School Magazine*.

In February 2016 *The School Magazine* celebrated its centenary and to celebrate this important milestone the Centre invited its readers, past and present, to share their memories of the Magazine. These memories were collated and reveal the huge impact and influence *The School Magazine* has had on generations of primary age children. *The School Magazine: Readers' Memories Celebrate Its Centenary* tell their stories and is a wonderful tribute to a 'literary treasure'.

Researching Ethel Turner was....

Visiting the Centre in September were Philippa Poole, granddaughter of Ethel Turner and her daughter, Belinda Sharpe. They were looking at research files on Ethel. During the research process Philippa and Belle Alderman AM discovered that they had been corresponding together for 29 years. The late Victor Crittenden started the correspondence 2 years earlier while Lu Rees had started the process by writing to Ethel's publisher in the late 1970s. A very long association!

Philippa and Belinda read the story of 'Little Miss Anzac' by Mrs W.A. Holman illustrated by Nelle Rodd. They enjoyed hearing about the work of Shellee Young, our intern, who found an e-copy of this book and more information and wrote it all up for *Reading Time*, using our article in the journal from some years back by the donor of this book.

Philippa and Belinda then wanted to know whether the Centre had Peter Gouldthorpe's artwork for 'A Walk to School' a picture book by Ethel which was very unusual for her. We certainly did, holding 2 beautiful pieces, a preliminary and the stunning final. Both have been beautifully mounted, as the National Gallery of Australia had exhibited 17 Centre artworks in 1993 when they also held an exhibition of Jeannie Baker's artwork.

Philippa loved looking at our collection of Ethel's rare books including the Dutch edition of *Seven Little Australians* (1898?), the Icelandic edition (donated by the late Dr Anne Clyde), and our new rare book donated by Max Brown with Ethel Turner's signature as a school prize. Philippa loved how clear the handwriting was. If you plan to visit the Centre, ask to see these treasures.
